1:00 pm–2:00 pm	Session 3: The Bull's Effect on Bovine IVF: Biological Variability and Its Impact on Efficiency and Profitability Presented by Dr. Paula Rodriguez-Villamil (Genus plc/ABS) <i>This presentation examines the significant and quantifiable effect of the bull on the outcomes of in vitro bovine embryo production (IVF). Using real-world data from 71,263 IVF sessions and 5,464 bulls demonstrates that bull selection is the most impactful variable in the IVF chain, more so than the laboratory, the protocol, or the donor. The presentation addresses four key areas: (1) the documented effect of the bull on fertilization, (2) the affected production KPIs, (3) practical strategies to close this gap through customized SOPs and data governance, and (4) the real economic impact of using a low-fertility bull. The presentation concludes with a closed-loop optimization model that integrates batch monitoring, a "5-session barrier," and interlaboratory performance cards, geared toward more efficient, predictable, and cost-effective insemination.</i>	Exhibit Hall A

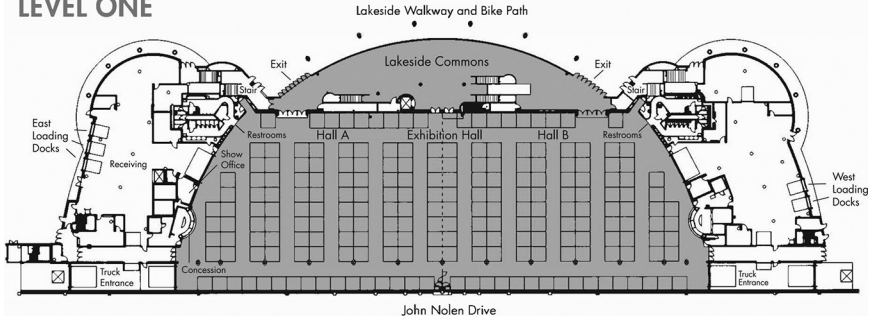

LEVEL ONE

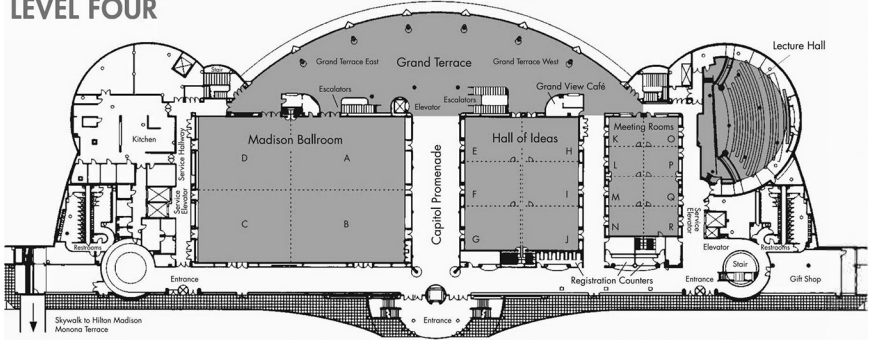


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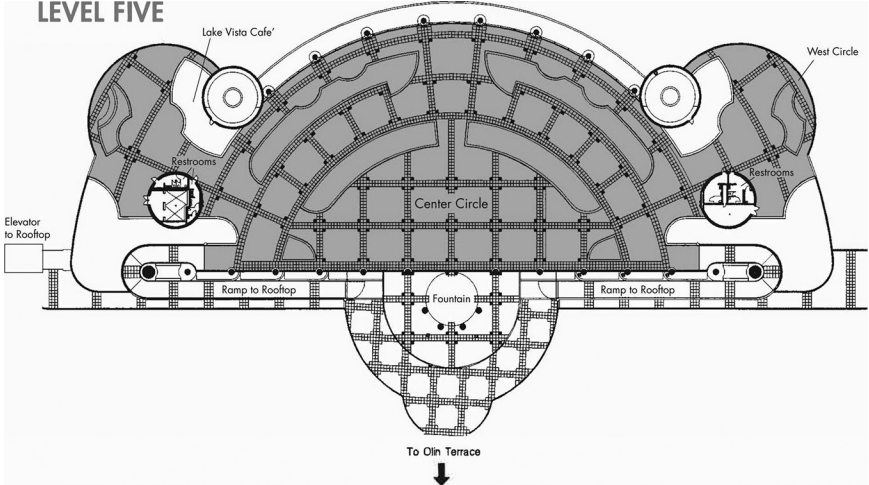
